1 Welcome, Introductions and Aims of the Meeting

The Chair welcomed everyone to the seventh meeting. PDG members, NICE staff and collaborators introduced themselves and the Chair conveyed apologies from members who could not attend. The Chair also welcomed Wendi Slater from South West Public Health observatory as an expert.

The Chair outlined the objectives of the day:

- To discuss and develop recommendations on surveillance
- To discuss and develop recommendations on workforce training and capacity building
- To consider the revisions to the external environment recommendations
- To receive a summary of the feedback from stakeholders on the evidence consultation

3 Minutes of last meeting

The PDG were asked to review the minutes from PDG 6. These were approved.

Matters arising from minutes of PDG 6:

- The Chair asked the PDG to send their biography to Melinda if they had not already done so.
- HW updated the PDG on child equestrian helmets and standards for fitting to the PDG. The law states that children under 14 years

must wear a properly fitted hat while riding on the road. In a shop, there is normally a sales adviser trained to fit the helmet on the customer. For online purchases fitting information is provided. All riding schools and Pony Club activities require children to have a correctly fitting hat. All hats have to meet the BS standard. Update on epidemiology data from JV requested - and what definition of urban/rural was adopted by SWPHO All other actions have been completed. Monitoring and surveillance issues - A&E pilot 4 Wendi Slater from South West Public Health Observatory gave a presentation on a pilot that introduces enhanced data collection which can routinely be collected by A & E staff. Three methods are being explored: enhanced collection on injuries for all attendees; interviewing 15% of attendees where possible and during daylight hours; and attendee optional self-entry of data. Questions and discussion 5 The Chair thanked Wendi Slater and asked PDG members for questions of clarification. The following were discussed: The possibility of patients recording the data themselves rather than A&E staff There will be collection of data relating to firework injuries All ages to be recorded as part of the pilot Costs of collecting data Collecting data in a rural setting as proximity to hospital influences use of A & E and that impacts on rural attendances compared to urban attendances Training of staff that are collecting data The link with clinical audit departments The time taken for data collection Within A & E there is an increasing interest in injury prevention and this needs to be encouraged so that it filters to all staff All three pilot study sites are keen to act as advocates and share the learning. If it could be demonstrated that these pilots have reduced injuries it would encourage other Trusts to adopt the scheme In some A & E departments where there is collaboration with the Police there has been success in intervening (eg by targeting violence injury hotspots) Commissioning data sets used Other data that is routinely collected by Trusts on injuries and A&E attendance Cycle helmets – epidemiology and effectiveness 6 Mike Hayes and Heather Ward gave a presentation on the epidemiology and effectiveness of cycle helmets based on work undertaken by TRL for the DfT. The full TRL report is due to be published in early 2010.
