Issues to note	Two different sets of costs have been used to inform the economic analysis, both published in 2023, the one set by the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities (OHID) and the other set by the National Institute for Economic and Social Research (NIESR). Both sets capture NHS/PSS and wider public sector costs. Separate analyses were conducted, each using each of the two sets of costs respectively. This was done because it was considered inappropriate to combine the two cost sets, as different methods were used in each study for the cost estimation and some cost elements were overlapping, meaning that if cost sets were combined into the same analysis this would likely result in some costs being double counted.
