

HTG188 – Endoscopic mastectomy and endoscopic wide local excision for breast cancer

SNOMED CT provides clinical terms for entry into the patient record to record clinical information relevant to that encounter; the mandated classifications (OPCS-4 or ICD-10) provide a method to collect and aggregate data to allow accurate and consistent data analysis.

B28.2 Partial excision of breast NEC

Includes: Wedge excision of breast NEC

Wide excision of breast NEC

Y76.3 Endoscopic approach to other body cavity

The OPCS-4 codes for endoscopic mastectomy are as follows:

B27.- Total excision of breast (fourth character dependent on the description of the mastectomy)

Y76.3 Endoscopic approach to other body cavity

Note: The codes within **B27.** - do not include any associate lymph node removal and these are classified with an additional code from categories **T85-T87**.

C50.- Malignant neoplasm of breast

or
