

HTG265 - Endoscopic radical inguinal lymphadenectomy

SNOMED CT provides clinical terms for entry into the patient record to record clinical information relevant to that encounter; the mandated classifications (OPCS-4 or ICD-10) provide a method to collect and aggregate data to allow accurate and consistent data analysis.

Procedure and device:

SNOMED CT preferred term (concept ID)

Endoscopic radical excision of inguinal lymph nodes (839091000000107)

OPCS-4 code(s):

T85.5 Block dissection of inguinal lymph nodes

or

T87.7 Excision or biopsy of inguinal lymph node

Y76.3 Endoscopic approach to other body cavity

or

Y76.5 Robotic assisted minimal access approach to other body cavity

If resection of the saphenous vein is required the following codes are included:

L93.1 Excision of vein NEC

Y76.3 Endoscopic approach to other body cavity

or

Y76.5 Robotic assisted minimal access approach to other body cavity

A site code is also selected:

Z98.5 Long saphenous vein

Z98.6 Short saphenous vein

Z39.5 Saphenous vein NEC

Note: A laterality code is also added: either **Z94.1 Bilateral operation** or **Z94.2 Right sided operation** or **Z94.3 Left sided operation**
