

HTG418 - Implantation of miniature lens systems for advanced age-related macular degeneration

SNOMED CT provides clinical terms for entry into the patient record to record clinical information relevant to that encounter; the mandated classifications (OPCS-4 or ICD-10) provide a method to collect and aggregate data to allow accurate and consistent data analysis.

Insertion of prosthetic intraocular lens (69724002)

OPCS-4 code(s):

C75.1 Insertion of prosthetic replacement for lens NEC

Note: A supplementary OPCS-4 code is used to identify the method of concurrent extraction of lens (**C71-C74**).

Note: It is not possible to capture the type of prosthetic lens replacement using OPCS-4. Additional codes may also be required if other surgical procedures are performed concurrently.
