The impact on equality has been assessed during guidance development according to the principles of the NICE Equality scheme.

Briefing

1. Have any potential equality issues been identified during the briefing process (development of the brief or discussion at the committee meeting), and, if so, what are they?

Age and gender: Men and those above 50 years of age are at increased risk of having both alcoholic and non-alcoholic chronic liver disease.

Ethnicity: Viral hepatitis is more common than alcoholic liver disease in Asian and African populations, especially in young patients.

Disability: People with end-stage liver disease are likely to be covered under the Equality Act 2010 if their condition has lasted more than 12 months or is likely to do so and has a substantial adverse impact on day-to-day activities.

Socioeconomic status: Many people dying from liver disease come from deprived socioeconomic backgrounds. Those dying of alcoholic liver disease may have mental health problems and/or drug dependence problems which complicate their social circumstances such that they have little family or social support.

2. What is the preliminary view as to what extent these potential equality issues need addressing by the committee? (If there are exclusions listed in the brief (for example, populations, treatments or settings), are these justified?)

This was not thought to have an impact on the assessment of the procedure. No exclusions were applied.
