No additional equality issues were identified by stakeholders during consultation.

4.5 Have the Committee's considerations of equality issues been described in the final guideline document, and, if so, where?

The committee described women-centred care in section 1.8 of the guideline (planning birth) and the associated rationale and impact section. The committee highlighted that it is important that planning is individualised and tailored to each woman. A cross-reference to the <u>patient experience in adult NHS services</u> guideline was also included to highlight issues related to communication and information provision (such as for people who need for a translator).

The committee agreed that the guideline would improve access to services and fulfil NICE's obligations to advance equality because all recommendations apply to all women equally once a twin or triplet pregnancy has been identified.
