4.1 Have any additional potential equality issues been raised during the consultation, and, if so, how has the Committee addressed them?

Two stakeholders raised a concern that the recommendations regarding the selection of patients for transfer or treatment of emergency AAA raised the danger of discriminatory practice based on age and/or sex. The committee noted these concerns but in the absence of evidence of inequitable practice across the NHS, were unable to make recommendations to address this. The committee were content that as specialist input would inform the decision to transfer that this would preclude any inappropriate decisions being made based on preconceptions about the likelihood of survival.

One stakeholder enquired whether socioeconomic status and deprivation had been considered, as lifestyle risk factors for co-morbidities and poor outcomes are linked to deprivation. The committee considered various inequalities, including the role of socioeconomic status and deprivation, when they discussed each evidence review. The committee did not believe that their recommendations would prohibit access of lower socioeconomic groups to the best treatment options available within an NHS context, where equitable access to is a core principle of healthcare provision. In relation to risk factors, no direct evidence was identified demonstrating that socioeconomic status was associated with the presence of AAA, as well as aneurysm growth or rupture.
