1 & 3. Welcome and objectives for the meeting

The Chair welcomed the Committee members and attendees to the fourth meeting on Antimicrobial stewardship. The Committee members and attendees introduced themselves.

 - o How it should be done?
- Reviewing the gaps in the evidence and the research recommendations
- Noting new issues to be recorded in the committee discussion section

8. Expert testimony 4

The Chair introduced Lucy Yardley, committee member, who gave expert testimony on the subject of 'Online handwashing intervention to prevent transmission of infection'. As this testimony contained data that had not yet been published, it was heard in a closed session.

9. Expert testimony 5

The Chair introduced Tim Chadborn, Behavioural Insights Lead Researcher at Public Health England, who gave expert testimony on the subject of 'Providing information to patients and to GPs'.

The Committee then discussed the issues presented in the expert testimonies in relation to this guideline.

The Chair thanked the experts for their presentations and contribution to the development of the guideline.

11. Key issues from testimony for the recommendations

The Chair asked the committee to identify the key themes from the expert testimony that would inform the recommendations and presented a slide with a reminder of the objectives of the day and the key questions that need to be addressed.
