Eating disorders: treatment and recognition

The impact on equality has been assessed during guidance development according to the principles of the NICE equality policy.

3.1 Have the potential equality issues identified during the scoping process been addressed by the Committee, and, if so, how?

The following equality issues were identified during the scoping process:

Co-morbidities conditions (i.e. diabetes)

Preventative action

Outcomes for families

Inclusiveness of all eating disorders

Age groups

Gender

Ethnicity

Geographical location

Comorbidities were addressed specifically in the guideline. Recommendations were made addressing how to treat someone with a comorbidity, including diabetes.

Prevention was considered outside of the scope.

Outcomes for families was covered in a specific review question.

Recommendations were made under general principles of care about how to include families in the assessment, treatment and management of those with an eating disorder.

All eating disorders within the scope were addressed including anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa, binge eating disorder and EDNOS.

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3.1 Have the potential equality issues identified during the scoping process been addressed by the Committee, and, if so, how?

Evidence from all age groups were included in the review and recommendations were made on for different age groups where there was evidence.

Gender and ethnicity were considered under the general principles of care, ensuring that people of any gender or religion, believe, culture or family origin have equal access to care

Geographical location was highlighted as an area of concern for coordinating care. Ensuring good communication between services should a person with an eating disorder move or study in a different part of the country.
