Urinary tract infection in children

2 Quality standard background

A NICE quality standard is a concise set of statements designed to drive and measure priority quality improvements within a particular area of care.

A NICE quality standard is derived from NICE guidance and other guidance accredited by NICE. A quality standard is developed independently by NICE, in collaboration with NHS and social care professionals, their partners and service users. Recommendations relating to effectiveness and cost effectiveness, people's experience of using services, safety issues, equality and cost impact are considered during the development process.

At the outset of development, evidence relating to areas where quality improvement is most required and will be considered by the Quality Standards Advisory Committee (QSAC).

NICE quality standards are central to supporting the Government's vision for an NHS and Social Care system focussed on delivering the best possible outcomes for people who use services, as detailed in the <u>Health and Social</u> Care Act (2012).

The quality standard development process is described in detail on the <u>NICE</u> website.

3 Topic overview

This topic overview describes core elements of the quality standard. This includes: population and condition to be covered, key source guidance to be used to underpin potential quality statements, any related NICE guidance and

quality standards, published current practice information and national or routine indicators and performance measures. Where guidance other than NICE guidance is used as source guidance, these should meet minimum quality criteria as defined in the NICE's accreditation programme.

3.1 Timing

The development of the quality standard will begin in December 2012 and is expected to take 10 months to complete.

4 Population and condition to be covered

This quality standard will cover the care of infants, children and young people younger than 16 years with a first or recurrent upper or lower urinary tract infection who are not already known to have underlying uropathy.
