2 Introduction

2.1 NICE quality standards

NICE quality standards are a concise set of prioritised statements designed to drive measurable quality improvements within a particular area of health or care.

The standards are derived from high-quality guidance, such as that from NICE or <u>accredited</u> by NICE. They are developed independently by NICE, in collaboration with healthcare professionals and public health and social care practitioners, their partners and service users. Information on priority areas, people's experience of using services, safety issues, equality and cost impact are considered during the development process.

NICE quality standards are central to supporting the Government's vision for a health and social care system that is focused on delivering the best possible outcomes for people who use services, as detailed in the <u>Health and Social</u> <u>Care Act (2012)</u>.

2.2 This topic overview

3 This quality standard

This quality standard will cover renal replacement therapy services for renal failure in adults, young people and children.

4 Existing indicators

- QOF CKD001 <u>The contractor establishes and maintains a register of</u> patients aged 18 or over with CKD (US National Kidney Foundation: Stage <u>3 to 5 CKD)</u>
- QOF CKD002 <u>The percentage of patients on the CKD register in whom</u> the last blood pressure reading (measured in the preceding 12 months) is <u>140/85 mmHg or less</u>
- QOF CKD003 <u>The percentage of patients on the CKD register with</u> <u>hypertension and proteinuria who are currently treated with an ACE-I or</u> <u>ARB</u>
- QOF CKD004 <u>The percentage of patients on the CKD register whose</u> notes have a record of a urine albumin:creatinine ratio (or protein:creatinine ratio) test in the preceding 12 months
