

Dimethyl fumarate for treating moderate to severe plaque psoriasis

Information for the public

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Dimethyl fumarate (Skilarence) is available on the NHS as a possible treatment for plaque psoriasis in adults if the psoriasis:

- is severe and affects quality of life, and
- has not improved with conventional systemic treatments and phototherapy, or these cannot be used.

Systemic treatments work throughout the whole body.

Treatment with dimethyl fumarate should be stopped after 16 weeks if the psoriasis does not improve enough.

When assessing how psoriasis affects your quality of life, healthcare professionals should take into account any disabilities or difficulties in communicating you might have.

If you are not eligible for dimethyl fumarate but are already taking it, you should be able to continue until you and your doctor decide when best to stop.

Is this treatment right for me?

Your healthcare professionals should give you clear information, talk with you about your options and listen carefully to your views and concerns. Your family can be involved too, if you wish. Read more about [making decisions about your care](#).
