Lapatinib for women with previously treated advanced or metastatic breast cancer

Introduction

Nurses working in this area of health have reviewed the consultation documents. The following concerns have been raised around measuring of exceptional circumstances:

1. It is considered that the criteria for 3 month life extension in the current climate may be difficult to measure because the new NICE guidelines in advanced breast do not allow use of herceptin beyond progression and the drug may potentially be used at an earlier time than previously would be. Also progression free survival could be better surrogate in this instance and may give better overview of potential response. We have no other alternative at present post herceptin which leads to point 2.
