She is also a non- executive director of a Trust which runs a preschool programme. And she is currently on a Department for Education (DFE) advisory group.</p> <p>Phil Cutler – Phil’s wife Dr Mfanwy Franks is a Senior Researcher at The Children’s Society.</p> <p><u>Non-personal pecuniary interest</u></p> <p>Catherine Law – Catherine carries out research in the field of early years, though not specifically in interventions to promote social and emotional wellbeing. Her research relates to the wider determinants of health (particularly physical health) in the</p>	

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	<p>early years and the relationship to national policy.</p> <p>Catherine may benefit from future research funding in this topic area.</p> <p>David McDaid – David has received several research and policy analysis grants at European Commission level to look at the economics of early intervention. He has also done work for the Department of Health and may benefit from future research funding in this topic area.</p> <p>Stephanie Taylor – Stephanie’s employing organisation has received, and is currently in receipt of, research funding for studies in the well being of children and young people.</p> <p>Jane Putsey – Jane is a member of The Breastfeeding Network (BFN) and on the UNICEF UK baby friendly designation committee. Both organisations may receive funding.</p> <p>Eva Lloyd – Eva’s department at the University of East London has in the past received research funding in this field and it is likely that she will seek further research funding in the future.</p> <p>Stephen Walters - The department that Stephen works for (SchARR, University of Sheffield) has contracts and/or research grants with the NIHR, HTA and NICE.</p> <p><u>Personal non-pecuniary interest</u></p> <p>Catherine Law - Catherine advocates for the promotion of health in the early years, particularly in relation to reduction of health inequalities.</p> <p>Bren McNerney – Bren has implementation interests in this topic.</p> <p>Eva Lloyd – Eva has undertaken research in this area for over 25 years. Suggested revisions to the recommendations (Amanda Killoran, Analyst, NICE) Amanda Killoran provided an overview of the suggested revisions to the recommendations.</p>	

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	<p>b. Discussion (All) The committee discussed the recommendations. Specific points raised included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It was noted that there were many influences on social and emotional wellbeing. The guidance needs to focus on the interventions in the referral and scope (home visiting and early education). • The committee supported that the distinction between the individual and population level should be explicit, particularly for the use of risk factors for identification. • The committee supported the use of the term 'parents' (rather than "carer" or focusing mainly on mothers).

Discussion (All) Committee</p>	

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	<p>members discussed whether the guidance should be updated following evidence submitted by the British Association of Dermatologists and stakeholder consultation. The following points were raised:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This is an area of scientific uncertainty; there is polarisation of views from stakeholders; • Stakeholder comments do not change the views held by PHIAC prior to consultation. • Two new referrals received from the DH on vitamin D and safe sunlight exposure provide an opportunity for the evidence on the efficacy of SPF to be reviewed. <p>In conclusion PHIAC was not minded to revise the guidance at this point. However, it was agreed that the current footnote relating to SPF in recommendation 3 should be moved into the main body of text to highlight the behavioural issues associated with applying sunscreen.</p> <p>Next Steps (Antony Morgan, Associate Director, CPHE) Antony provided an outline of the process and key dates. The Review Decision will be published on the 15th August.</p>
